Feedback Obtained
<p>There is an established mechanism to collect feedback from the PG students of final Semester having at least 75 p.c. of attendance, on curriculum design, teaching skill and University administration as a whole. Nevertheless, suggestions from students gathered from time to time are incorporated, with necessary modifications, whenever revision of curricula and syllabi is taken up. The University collects feedback from alumni with respect to curriculum, along with other aspects of the teaching learning process. It discusses the vision/mission/goals of the department with the students at the time of revision of syllabus and curriculum. Feedback has also been obtained from the visitors of foreign universities, invited distinguished scholars, UGC visiting fellows, etc., as well as academicians who visit our campus for various academic assignments as well as during participation in national and international conferences and workshops. Our faculty members also interact with faculty from national and international levels and this helps to improve the standard of curriculum. In the University structure, the senior faculty members from affiliated colleges as a part of the Board of Studies, UG/PG Council, Executive Council, and The Court. So, University always invites the feedback, recommendations, and revised curriculum and syllabi are obtained from the affiliated colleges as and when required and discussed in the meetings of all of the above authorities/bodies for incorporation and approval. Curriculum aspects are strengthened by revision of syllabi at par with emerging trends and to meet global demand by giving thrust on application oriented subjects. An Internal Quality Assurance Cell is in force and under the aegis of the Cell, periodic meetings are held with the Heads of the Departments and other members. Right from the Board of Studies level up to The Court, care is taken to ensure quality sustenance and enhancement. University has prepared a questionnaire and sent to all students in order to assess the quality of the curriculum. The Vice-Chancellor and Deans are frequently discussing with the IQAC members and Heads of different academic and administrative departments, and reiterate the need for quality not only in teaching, research and extension, but also in University administration and campus life through direct feedback study. Feedback from students are also taken, which is subsequently analysed to</p>

improve the teaching-learning process.

The University Museum also provides opportunity to the students and other visitors for knowing the rich heritage and culture of Burdwan. Students are encouraged to participate in various academic activities, apart from classroom interactions, like participation in the inter-university students' seminars/cultural events/sports events, project competitions organized by various departments training in leading academic/research organizations /industrial houses awareness programmes in specialized areas are also organized inside and outside the campus. University proposed to introduce Semester system with CBCS at UG level w.e.f 2017-18. The Executive Council considered the syllabi for Entrance examination of Course Work Programme as per the provisions of the UGC-Regulation-2016 of different science Departments and approved the same to be

effective from 2017. The Council considered the proposed syllabus of B.Sc. 3-year General Course of Studies in Environmental Science from the academic year 2017-18 and framed the rules and regulations for two years B.P.Ed. Course under semester system.

Teaching and Learning

For quality-teaching learning process, various departments namely Statistics, Mathematics, Sociology, Chemistry, Economics, Mass Communication, Biotechnology, Geography, History and Sanskrit engaged Visiting Faculties in some super specialized areas during 2016-17. Moreover, the Council considered the newly framed curriculum for 2-year bachelor of Physical Education (B.P.Ed) programme and approved the same to be made effective from the academic year 2016-17 onward. The Council introduced 'MCQ' in ENGC AND MIL(COMPULSORY LANGUAGES) at Part I Examination and in ENV5 in Part III Examination, from the year of examination 2017 and onwards providing OMR sheet instead of blank Answer scripts.

Examination and Evaluation

CBCS System of Examinations with grading system has been implemented in MA/MSc/M.Com levels. Full internal checking of the scripts is in practice in order to facilitate speedy publication of results. To maintain the confidentiality, the University has introduced the "Coding system" of the answer scripts of all Courses. The system of showing assessed answer scripts to the students of the Post-graduate level has been introduced. Utmost care is taken to maintain the confidentiality in every stage of examination and evaluation e.g. the preparation of question papers, moderation, and submission of marks, tabulation and publication of results.

Research and Development

IQAC takes the following measures to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of Research projects:
(i) Promotion of research atmosphere in the Institution by sensitizing the faculties and providing the necessary information for getting of funds from various sponsoring agencies. (ii) Making provision for good infrastructure and laboratory facility

Human Resource Management

In order to ensure administrative efficiency, the entire human resources in the University are managed under the umbrella of four departments like Registrar, Finance, Controller and IQAC. Training programmes are organized to train the staff and officers of the University thorough HRDC. The IQAC cell takes care of the general academic atmosphere in the university and tries to promote a sound and cordial relationship amongst teachers and students. The Departmental Heads keep liaison with the concerned faculty Dean and conduct workshop/training programme/conferences for effective management of human resources.

(i) Energy conservation • Our University campus encompasses a spacious area and embraces with green plants, maximum daylight and good ventilation of air are utilized and this helps minimize the use of electric power for lights and fans. • CFLs are used in some important areas. • Miniature Circuit Breakers (MCBs) are used at most of the points • Initiation of the process of e-governance has been able to reduce the use of papers. • University Golden Jubilee building is fully lighted outside by Solar light. Our green group of students are shouldering the responsibility of putting off the light and fans in their classes after the last period. This action is directed towards saving huge amount of energy. (ii) Use of renewable energy The University has installed one 100 KW Roof Top Solar PV Power Plant with net-metering facility. Presently, Higher Education Department of Govt. of West Bengal has already released 70 of the Project cost, i.e., Rs 84.50 lakh which has in turn been transferred to WBREDA, the executive agency of the Government and the rest 30 will be provide by them. The produced electricity will be supplied to the grid through net-metering system to get discount in electric bill. (iii) Water harvesting Conservation of water resources is under the priority list. It is evident in the repair, restoration and reclamation of water bodies within the academic administrative University Campuses, which has been funded by water resources investigation and development department, Government of West Bengal under the 'Jal Dharo Jal Bharo Scheme'. The moat and water bodies have recently been reclaimed to cope with growing challenges of water scarcity and lowering of water table. University has raised a rain water harvesting system which reflects its concern for water conservation. A rainwater harvest storage tank has been established at Rajbati premises. The Golden Jubilee building is fully equipped with rainwater harvesting system and recycling of waste water treatment plant. (iv) Efforts for carbon neutrality The University has a sprawling green campus covered with several small and big water bodies. The whole campus is unique in terms of its flora and fauna. Its sanctity and beauty are preserved by the University community. Many rare plantations like Mahogany (Sweitenia mahogany) are over 150 years old. Botanical survey of India, under Biodiversity Act for conservation of valuable plants and animals, has therefore declared it as "Biodiversity Heritage site" since 03.12.2014. The species inside the campus are especially important for maintaining carbon neutrality. Medicinal Garden: Botany department of this University maintains over 50 species. Percentage of power requirement of the University met by the renewable energy sources: Around 30 per cent.

The following initiatives have been taken by the University to make the campus eco-friendly. • The natural ventilation throughout the campus and lighting in most of the areas help to conserve the energy demand. In classrooms and faculty

rooms of the departments, energy efficient lighting fittings like T5, CFLs and LEDs are mostly used. By putting forward the idea of solar power installations, this university has also radiated an eco-friendly experience. Eco-friendly generators in front of different departments have already been installed which has reduced the emission as well as noise pollutions. • To renovate and fill the "Lahar" (historic moat) created under the financial support of Department of Water Resources, Investigation Development, Government of West Bengal is the unique feature of watershed management of this university. Re-plantation measures have been undertaken. Drive has been taken in some parts of the water-bodies inside the Golapbag campus by removing the weeds and cleaning the adjoining areas. It will definitely improve the water holding capacity. Lahar and other water-bodies are used for pisciculture. • For awareness, no-smoking notice boards have been placed at certain important locations in the university premises. • Students are encouraged to make the campus a plastic-free zone. The seeds are branded as " Krishan-Bandhu". • Facilities are provided for testing of thalassemia disease for the students and the entire community of the university through advance genetic test by sequencing method. This facility is also extended to the needy local community. • The university also extends its support to the Burdwan Medical College for undertaking pre-natal gene test of the Thalassemia carrier couples to birth normal child. • The Meghnad Saha Planetarium was established in 1994 for creating scientific environment and dissemination of knowledge among students starting from school level, teachers and common people in the South Bengal. It is not only a pride of The University of Burdwan, but perhaps the only planetarium in India operating under the auspices of any university. The Planetarium is organizing the shows on the mysteries of universe, birth of stars, motion of planets, aspects of lunar exploration and other astrophysical phenomenon.
